THE IMPACT OF THE RESURRECTION

Recently I have been looking at various statements people have made about the resurrection of Christ. If someone were to ask you, what proof do you have that Jesus died, was buried, and then rose from the dead, how would you respond? I suspect many who profess faith in Christ have not given that much consideration. Most of us were taught to believe that from childhood. We kind of began there.

For that reason, I think it's difficult for us to have a conversation or debate with those who do not believe this. Most likely, they are seeking a kind of proof that simply cannot be produced. We don't have what would be considered empirical evidence to back up our beliefs, empirical being observable or verifiable facts or evidence.

Our faith is based on belief, on trust in God, and the words of scripture. However scripture does claim that there were folks who did observe and verify bodily appearances of Jesus following his crucifixion and resurrection. Some discount this because those folks were followers of Jesus during his earthly ministry.

Still, there is some observable evidence that is difficult to discount. It seems that the resurrection had a significant impact on those followers of Jesus. For instance, when Jesus was arrested in the garden, one of his disciples drew his sword and attacked the servant of the high priest. Peter was so frightened after Jesus' arrest that he denied knowing him. After the resurrection the followers of Jesus sought neither confrontation nor anonymity. They boldly proclaimed their belief that Jesus was the Christ and they were willing to suffer and die because of those beliefs.

We are told, by scripture that Thomas had to see and touch the body of Jesus in order to believe. The followers of Jesus didn't try to suppress Thomas's questions and doubts. They welcomed and encouraged him and Thomas wound up convinced that he had seen and touched the risen Christ.

Mary Magdalen and, perhaps, some other women went to the tomb to prepare the body for burial then rushed back to Jesus' other followers to tell them that Jesus had arisen. Their claims could easily have been discounted because of first century attitudes toward women, yet their testimony was accepted and scripture until this day testifies that women were the first to proclaim the resurrection of Jesus.

Will any of the above convince someone that Jesus really did rise from the dead? Probably not. For me, the evidence I have is more personal. I believe that Jesus rose form the dead because I have experienced his presence in my life. I read how the lives of others were transformed by the resurrection of Jesus and it resonates with me because I have been transformed by his presence.

There are folks who like to argue and debate issues like this and I don't doubt that there is a place for that. All I can do is observe and verify what has happened in my life and allow others to observe that as well. And, in reality, that may be the best evidence any of us can offer.

As we approach Easter and the celebration of Christ's resurrection, may you know the joy and the peace and the strength that can only be found in the risen Christ.

Music for Holy Week, Easter, and 'After the Resurrection'

The Palm Sunday service on April 2 features Lenten Meditations Music, a service of readings about Jesus' final days, with music to reflect upon those moments. The service will begin with the waving of palm leaves and music that celebrates Christ's triumphant entry into the city of Jerusalem. The service continues with Jesus gathering the children in his arms, and a lovely piece "The Children of the World" with flute. The service shifts to Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane. From there the arrest, trial, crucifixion and death, all told in story and song, including "Out of the Deep" from Rutter's Requiem, with cello; the ever-popular "Beautiful Saviour" ("Old Crusader's Hymn") sung by the Men's Ensemble and Dan Forrest's exquisite "Arise, My Soul, Arise," sung by the Women's Ensemble and violin, and ending with the haunting "Even the Heavens Are Weeping" that concludes with a "Death March" to end this special service.

On Maundy Thursday, The Grace Street Quartet will sing a medley of songs reflecting our love of Jesus. There will be a short Good Friday service in the chapel at noon, with Keith Jameson singing, and Easter will once again feature celebratory music and hymns. After Easter, Carlton reflects on what happens 'After the Resurrection', and Katie Walenceus offers "I Know that My Redeemer Liveth" from Handel's Messiah. Chancel Choir and soloists will sing music to reflect creation's beauty on April 23, with Haydn's glorious "The Heavens Are Telling" from The Creation. Family Night Meals Resume on Maundy Thursday

Somehow it seems appropriate to restart our Family Meal option on April 6, Maundy Thursday. Maundy Thursday is the night we remember Jesus' last meal with his disciples before the crucifixion. Gather for supper, and then stay for the service of remembrance as Communion is shared by intinction.

The meal will be available 5:30 pm-6:15 pm in the Fellowship Hall. The Maundy Thursday service will begin at 6:30 pm in the Sanctuary. The menu for Maundy Thursday is oven fried chicken, green beans, mac & cheese, and apple crisp with ice cream for dessert. A salad bar, bread, and beverage is included. The cost is \$10.00 for adults, \$5.00 for children, and no family pays more than \$30.00. Reservations are needed by 5:00 pm Friday, March 31, either online or by calling the church office.

Robby Stevenson, Jeff Rush, Dennis Moore, and Jim Firmin will prepare the Maundy Thursday meal and have agreed to prepare Wednesday night meals on a trial basis from April 12 until the end of May. The cost of the Wednesday night meal will remain the same: \$10.00 for adults, \$5.00 for children, and no family more than \$30.00. A new permanent reservation list will be created. To be placed on the permanent reservation list or to make a week by week reservation, call the church office (229-5557) or make a reservation online (fbcgwd.org) by 5:00 pm the Friday before the Wednesday you plan to eat. All meals will include an entrée, sides, a full salad bar, roll/bread, dessert. and beverage.

If you have a reservation for Maundy Thursday and did not specify that the reservation is for that night only, your name is on the permanent reservation list. No other action is needed unless you want your name removed from the permanent list.

Payment of FIRST QUARTER MISSIONS

After a lengthy Stewardship Committee meeting on Wednesday, March 22, the committee voted to pay First Quarter Missions on time and in full. The quarterly mission payment is \$21,175.00.

While the committee voted to pay First Quarter Missions, several committee members are concerned about paying missions "in full and on time" when the financials reflect, as of the end of February, a deficit in revenue to expenses of \$40,954.75.

In agreeing to pay First Quarter Missions, committee members also agreed to send a letter to all mission partners indicating that future missions payments would be dependent on gifts to the annual First Baptist Ministry Plan.

Therefore, the Stewardship Committee is asking the church family to prayerfully consider your gifts to the 2023 Ministry Plan so the committee does not face this difficult decision at the end of June with the payment of second guarter missions.
