- Commitment to Christ
- Faithfulness in attendance
- Faithfulness in stewardship
- Personal moral integrity
- Provide example to congregation that points to Christ and Christ's Spirit of love for all persons
- Seek to promote understanding and unity among all persons and groups
- Support the formulation of sound policies by the church
- Support the ministries of First Baptist
- Work to find spiritual solutions to major problems that affect the spiritual health of the church

Duties of a Deacon

- Minister to the spiritual and religious needs of the church and its members
- Committed to personal spiritual growth through Bible Study, church activities, and the offering of one's gifts
- Attend monthly Diaconate meetings and other meetings as called
- Lead in welcoming visitors and members to worship services
- Assist with observance of Communion
- Assist in other pastoral duties and needed



Youth Committee - Interim Youth Minister

I want to express my deep appreciation to Russell Martin and the Youth Committee for the ways that they continue to step up in the breech and keep our youth ministry on an even keel. FBC is fortunate to have such gifted and committed members.

In other news, I am making contacts in order to find a potential candidate for a part-time Interim Youth Minister. If a candidate can be identified, they will be interviewed by the Youth Committee. If the Youth Committee agrees on a candidate, they will coordinate next steps with the Personnel Committee. My hope is that we can agree on a position that includes fifteen or so hours per week with the interim present at least on Sundays and Wednesdays.

Pastoral Care

The Personnel Committee approved engaging David Corbitt and Amy Jennings to provide pastoral care from Tuesday afternoon through Saturday when I am not on site. This has greatly enhanced our ability to care for and minister to those in the hospital, those recovering at home, those in care facilities, and our homebound.

Encouraging Signs at FBC

The youth ministry is going strong (thanks to the Youth Committee mentioned above). On a recent Sunday, there were thirteen youth in SS, the largest group in a long time. Sign ups for fall and summer events have been strong.

Transition Team

The Transition Team led the congregation to do excellent work. They led the congregation in addressing the following:

- **Heritage** Congregational gathering to discuss FBC's rich heritage as well as creating a timeline of events in Fellowship Hall
- Mission and Vision Led the church to "tweak" the current Vision statement. The Mission was unchanged. At two congregational meetings, the church discussed, "What values does First Baptist hold dear? How is First Baptist living out its mission statement? What is the vision of the church in light of the mission statement?"
- Leadership The Diaconate gave three ad-hoc committees the task of updating church governing documents. They also charged the Personnel Committee to consider removing the Personnel Manual from other church documents and setting it up as a stand-alone document.
- **Connections** Elizabeth Nance-Coker and Carlton Allen spoke and shared about what it means to be "Baptist." Layne Smith also preached a sermon on the "Five Fragile Freedoms" that we Baptists hold dear.
- **Future** The Transition Team put together the church profile. The Pastor Search Committee, with input from the congregation, created the Senior Pastor Profile.


