"After" We've Had an Epiphany

"I have had an epiphany!" We exclaim this word "epiphany" when we come to the realization of something, or an illumination or disclosure of something. "Epiphany" also refers to the celebration of the coming of the Magi to see Jesus the first manifestation of Christ to the These wise Gentiles. men philosophers realized something extraordinary had happened in their midst - the birth of a Savior for all humankind. Once they had seen Jesus. they were warned not to return to Herod, and to take another route back to their homes.

We have now experienced the birth and the manifestation of Christ in human form once again this Christmas season. We have brought our gifts of tithes and offerings, voices, and hearts. We have bowed down and worshipped Him. Now what? Do we just go back to the same everyday life? Why don't we follow the Magi by another route... one that keeps Christ in our hearts all year long?

Let us take the meaning of Christmas and let it transform our lives in concrete ways, by giving more of ourselves to church, by making a deeper commitment to Bible study, by singing and praising God daily instead of just Sundays. Let us open our hearts and minds to the joy and wonder and hope and peace that Christ brings into this dark world with His light and grace. The Chancel Choir sings a beautiful anthem called "The Work of Christmas" on Epiphany, January 7, with music by Dan Forrest and text by Howard Thurman. The last line reads:

When the song of the angels is stilled, when the star in the sky is gone, when the kings and princes are home, when the shepherds are back with their flock, the work of Christmas begins.

Has Christmas changed you this season? Have you had your epiphany this year?

January 10: chicken pot pie, rice pilaf, rolls, tossed salad, apple salad, peach cobbler/cake, ice cream

January 17: baked spaghetti, corn on the cob, steamed broccoli, garlic bread, tossed salad, marinated slaw, cookies, ice cream

January 24: meat loaf, creamed potatoes and gravy, steamed vegetables, yeast rolls, tossed salad, ham and pea pasta salad, apple cobbler, ice cream

January 31: turkey and dressing, green beans, candied yams, cranberry sauce, tossed salad, broccoli salad, assorted fresh baked pies, ice cream


