GREENWOOD FIRST BAPTIST HISTORY

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The First Baptist Church of Greenwood was organized on September 25, 1870, with twenty-three persons present. The first building, a modest wood structure, was built in downtown Greenwood in 1870. The second church building, a much larger building made of brick, was dedicated on November 7, 1897. In the midtwentieth century, the church decided to move to a new site, its present location on Grace Street. The groundbreaking took place in 1954, and the congregation began to meet in its new facilities on August 5, 1956. On the first Sunday of 1968, the church broke ground for a new sanctuary. The congregation worshiped in the new sanctuary for the first time on Palm Sunday of 1971. After the sanctuary's completion, the former worship space was converted into the present fellowship hall. The sanctuary is widely known for its cathedral-like stature, the beautiful stained-glass windows (with symbols from the parables of Jesus on one side and from the miracles of Jesus on the other), the divided chancel, and the cross as its unmistakable focal point. In 2007, the church began a major renovation of its education and children's area; and in 2008, it started the last addition to the facility, a covered drive.

The history of First Baptist is far too rich to capture on a single page, but several highlights may be noted. FBC has always been a missions-minded church, having begun the South Main Baptist Church as a mission church in 1910. FBC has participated in and contributed to numerous community ministries, helping to provide food, shelter, medical care, and other services to people in the Lakelands area. From the founding of Connie Maxwell Children's Home in 1888 until the establishment of Connie Maxwell Baptist Church in 1912, FBC was the spiritual home of the Connie Maxwell children and staff. FBC birthed the Bowers-Rodgers Children's Home in 1989 and the United Center for Community Care in 2008. Members of FBC were critical in the establishment of the Greenwood Pathway House in 2013; and in 2020, the church made building a Habitat House the centerpiece of its 150th Anniversary celebration.

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The church has always affirmed the status and giftedness of women. From its inception, First Baptist Church gave women the right to vote on any matter which came before the church—a practice virtually unheard of in 1870—and in 1975, FBC ordained the first female Baptist deacon in the state of South Carolina. First Baptist has a long history of meaningful worship and beautiful music which are well-suited to its magnificent sanctuary.

The most important element of the church's history is its focus on the Lordship of Christ, followed by its commitment to the historic Baptist principle of the autonomy of the local church. These principles were clearly evidenced in 1970 when the church decided to accept any form of Christian baptism. In doing so, the congregation affirmed Christ's Lordship—they sought God's will rather than blindly following tradition (a very deeply entrenched tradition)— and they practiced their autonomy by following God's will even when the local association of churches expelled FBC from its membership.

When the <u>Cooperative Baptist Fellowship</u> was formed in May of 1991, FBC found a new home and began contributing and participating in 1995. The church's traditions—the lordship of Christ, God-centered worship, local church autonomy, passion for missions, the affirmation of women as God-called leaders—these and other qualities made the church a natural fit for CBF life. FBC consistently ranks as one of the top givers to the Beverly Greer Offering for State Missions, and many of its members have held positions of service and leadership in CBFSC. It is not surprising, then, that FBC is considered one of the flagship churches in <u>CBF of South Carolina</u>.

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FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH ASSETS

PROPERTY

The 6.39 acres known as First Baptist Church is located on Grace Street between Edgewood Avenue and Grace Terrace as well as an adjacent tract of land at the corner of North Street and Melrose Terrace.

First Baptist received the adjacent Edgewood Cemetery as a gift by James Self, owner of Greenwood Mills, in January 1987. First Baptist took ownership of the Edgewood Memorial Mausoleum in May 1995.

BUILDING

Except for the current sanctuary, First Baptist Church broke ground on the current building in 1954. The first service in the new building was on Sunday August 5, 1956. Construction of the current 800 seat sanctuary began in 1968 with the first services being held during holy week in April 1971. The sanctuary is known for its cathedral-like structure and beautiful stained-glass windows depicting symbols from the parables of Jesus on one side and the miracles of Jesus on the other. With a divided chancel, the focal point in the sanctuary is the cross hanging from the ceiling in the chancel. The sanctuary is also home to a Schantz Organ that consists of four manuals. The organ contains 73 ranks totaling 2,763 pipes.

The footprint of the First Baptist facility consists of approximately 62,000 square feet. The facility has a series of offices for church staff, a commercial kitchen, the Graham Shaw Library, and a fellowship hall which can seat approximately 187 people. The facility also houses an educational space for children, youth, and adults. First Baptist also has a morning ministry to area pre-school children called Cheerful Cherubs Preschool and Kindergarten. FBC owns two fifteen passenger buses which are used for church-related activities.

FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH FOUNDATION

First Baptist Foundation was established in 1997 with a \$1.25 million bequest from the estate of Eugene and Louise Milford. Gifts to the First Baptist Foundation add both value and longevity to the ministry of the church. Funds generated from investments can be used to support three areas of ministry – building maintenance, children and youth, and special events or activities. The current corpus of the Foundation is approximately \$2.8 million dollars.

1. Continue to build the trust and unity of a body of believers in order to carry out God's will and God's mission.

2. Expand and enhance our program to support families of younger children

3. Improve the spiritual formation of the church.

The theological/faith stance best describing the church:

Greenwood FBC tends to be theologically moderate.

Description of the educational program of the church:

The church offers an aggressive, proactive Christian educational program targeting four subgroups: children, youth, college students, and adults.

The children's ministry is based on establishing God as loving and caring and teaching children to follow that example.

The college students and youth groups are in a growth mode. Youth education is focused on helping youth establish Christian values and training in discipleship. College students focus on the transition from youth issues to adult Christians living in the community.

The Adults' focus is age based on younger married with young families through senior citizens and empty nesters.

FINANCIAL SUPPORT TO FULL-TIME STAFF:

First Baptist has an extensive Personnel Manual that covers a variety of topics. Some of the major items are listed below.

- 1) Competitive salary and benefits
- 2) Social Security (ministers pay at self-employed rate)

3) Housing Allowance (for ordained ministers – must be approved by the Diaconate)

- 4) Health Insurance (80% of staff members' cost paid by church)
- 5) Retirement (matching contribution based on experience and service)
- 6) Vacation (based on years of service)
- 7) Parental Leave
- 8) Sick Leave (no more than accumulated thirty days)
- 9) Sabbatical Leave (thirty days after seven years of service)
- 10) Continuing Education Leave and Funds
- 11) Travel and Staff Development Funds



GREENWOOD COMMUNITY INFORMATION

Greenwood is a charming small town located in the piedmont of South Carolina. Developed originally around the railroad and cotton mills, the town has grown and diversified into a dynamic economic area.

International as well as local companies call Greenwood their home. The town has a thriving uptown with shops, restaurants, and events.
